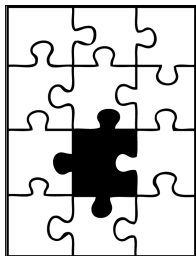


Section 5.5

Factoring Special Forms

Do you enjoy Solving P_z_1_s?

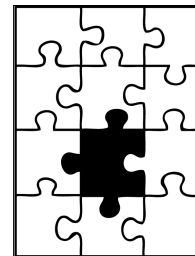


The process of solving puzzles is a natural way to develop problem-solving skills that are important to every area of our lives. Engaging in problem solving for sheer pleasure releases chemicals in the brain that enhance our feeling of well-being.

Perhaps this is why puzzles date back 12,000 years.

In this section, we develop factoring techniques by reversing the formulas for special products discussed previously.

These factorizations can be visualized by fitting pieces of a puzzle together to form rectangles.

- Review each of the following *Solved Problems* and complete each *Pencil Problem*.

Objective #1: Factor the difference of two squares.

✓ *Solved Problem #1*

1a. Factor: $16x^2 - 25$

Notice that the trinomial fits the form $A^2 - B^2$.

Thus, factor using $A^2 - B^2 = (A + B)(A - B)$.

$$\begin{aligned} 16x^2 - 25 &= (4x)^2 - 5^2 \\ &= (4x + 5)(4x - 5) \end{aligned}$$

Pencil Problem #1

1a. Factor: $36x^2 - 49y^2$

1b. Factor: $6y - 6x^2y^7$

First factor out the GCF.

$$6y - 6x^2y^7 = 6y(1 - x^2y^6)$$

Next, factor the difference of two squares.

$$\begin{aligned} 6y - 6x^2y^7 &= 6y(1 - x^2y^6) \\ &= 6y(1 + xy^3)(1 - xy^3) \end{aligned}$$

1b. Factor: $2x^3y - 18xy$ **1c.** Factor: $16x^4 - 81$

First, factor the difference of two squares.

$$16x^4 - 81 = (4x^2 + 9)(4x^2 - 9)$$

The factor of $4x^2 - 9$ is the difference of two squares and can be factored.

$$\begin{aligned} 16x^4 - 81 &= (4x^2 + 9)(4x^2 - 9) \\ &= (4x^2 + 9)(2x + 3)(2x - 3) \end{aligned}$$

1c. Factor: $81x^4 - 1$ **Objective #2:** Factor perfect square trinomials. **Solved Problem #2****2a.** Factor: $x^2 + 6x + 9$ Notice that the trinomial fits the form $A^2 + 2AB + B^2$.Thus, factor using $A^2 + 2AB + B^2 = (A + B)^2$.

$$\begin{aligned} x^2 + 6x + 9 &= x^2 + 2 \cdot x \cdot 3 + 3^2 \\ &= (x + 3)^2 \end{aligned}$$

 **Pencil Problem #2****2a.** Factor: $x^2 + 4x + 4$

2b. Factor: $16x^2 + 40xy + 25y^2$

Notice that the trinomial fits the form $A^2 + 2AB + B^2$.

Thus, factor using $A^2 + 2AB + B^2 = (A + B)^2$.

$$\begin{aligned} 16x^2 + 40xy + 25y^2 &= (4x)^2 + 2 \cdot 4x \cdot 5y + (5y)^2 \\ &= (4x + 5y)^2 \end{aligned}$$

2b. Factor: $9x^2 + 48xy + 64y^2$

2c. Factor: $4y^4 - 20y^2 + 25$

Notice that the trinomial fits the form $A^2 - 2AB + B^2$.

Thus, factor using $A^2 - 2AB + B^2 = (A - B)^2$.

$$\begin{aligned} 4y^4 - 20y^2 + 25 &= (2y^2)^2 - 2 \cdot 2y^2 \cdot 5 + (5)^2 \\ &= (2y^2 - 5)^2 \end{aligned}$$

2c. Factor: $x^2 - 10x + 25$

Objective #3: Use grouping to obtain the difference of two squares.

 **Solved Problem #3**

3. Factor: $x^2 + 10x + 25 - y^2$

Group as a perfect square trinomial, $x^2 + 10x + 25$, and y^2 to obtain the difference of two squares.

$$\begin{aligned} x^2 + 10x + 25 - y^2 &= (x^2 + 10x + 25) - y^2 \\ &= (x + 5)^2 - y^2 \\ &= (x + 5 + y)(x + 5 - y) \end{aligned}$$

 **Pencil Problem #3**

3. Factor: $x^2 - 6x + 9 - y^2$

Objective #4: Factor the sum or difference of two cubes. **Solved Problem #4**

4a. Factor: $x^3 + 27$

Notice that the polynomial fits the form $A^3 + B^3$.Thus it factors as $(A + B)(A^2 - AB + B^2)$.

$$\begin{aligned} x^3 + 27 &= x^3 + 3^3 \\ &= (x + 3)(x^2 - 3x + 3^2) \\ &= (x + 3)(x^2 - 3x + 9) \end{aligned}$$

 **Pencil Problem #4** 

4a. Factor: $x^3 + 64$

4b. Factor: $x^3 - 8$

Notice that the polynomial fits the form $A^3 - B^3$.Thus it factors as $(A - B)(A^2 + AB + B^2)$.

$$\begin{aligned} x^3 - 8 &= x^3 - 2^3 \\ &= (x - 2)(x^2 + x \cdot 2 + 2^2) \\ &= (x - 2)(x^2 + 2x + 4) \end{aligned}$$

4b. Factor: $x^3 - 27$

Answers for Pencil Problems (Textbook Exercise references in parentheses):

- 2a.** $(x + 2)^2$ (5.5 #49) **2b.** $(3x + 8y)^2$ (5.5 #63) **2c.** $(x - 5)^2$ (5.5 #51)
- 3.** $(x - 3 + y)(x - 3 - y)$ (5.5 #65) **4a.** $(x + 4)(x^2 - 4x + 16)$ (5.5 #75) **4b.** $(x - 3)(x^2 + 3x + 9)$ (5.5 #77)
